

Welcome to GreenMan Theatre and our production of the classic farce, Charley's Aunt. If you've seen shows here before, welcome back! If this is your first time at GreenMan Theatre, we hope you enjoy the show and will continue to join us for future performances.

Charley's Aunt marks the end of our busy 20th anniversary season. Our celebrations started last summer, with performances of original 10-minute plays, 8 to the Bar/ista, followed by Graveside Stories Cemetery Walks (a collaboration with the Elmhurst History Museum), our annual storytelling program Spooky Stories and Songs of the Season, and last fall's production of Blithe Spirit, by Noël Coward, a show that we originally presented back in our second season. This February and March, we presented Murder on the DeLorean Express, our annual dinner theatre murder mystery. The dinner show is an important fundraiser for the theatre, and this production was a huge success, as we played to sold-out houses each night.

We're already hard at work on our next season, reading original short play submissions for this summer's 8 to the Bar, which will be performed at the

Chicago Dance Factory in nearby Villa Park, on St. Charles Rd. We are also excited to announce that next fall we will bring *The Prom* to our stage. With music by Matthew Sklar, lyrics by Chad Beguelin, and a book by Bob Martin and Beguelin, *The Prom* follows four Broadway actors, as they travel to a conservative town in Indiana, to help a lesbian student banned from bringing



her girlfriend to their high school prom. Martin, Sklar, and Beguelin previously teamed up for the Broadway musical adaptation of *Elf*. Bob Martin is a well-known actor and writer; he co-wrote and starred in the musical *The Drowsy Chaperone*. *The Prom* was the first musical of the 2018–2019 Broadway season to be named a *New York Times* Critics Pick. Frank Rizzo, writing for *Variety*, wrote that *The Prom* is "a joyous, funny, and sweet production that should appeal to several generations of musical fans." Like to sing and dance? Auditions are May 25th and 26th, so mark your calendars and schedule your appointment soon!





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From the Past —

Back in 1892 —

This play takes place in 1892 Victorian England, and there may be some expressions and slang that are unfamiliar or puzzling to you. Some of them are explained here, along with some of the different customs of the time period.

Expressions

- Worry me like old Harry Harry is a nickname for the Devil.
- Going to see your uncle A euphemism for visiting the pawn broker when you're hard up for money.
- We'll be gone down or We're off down To leave a university, especially Oxford or Cambridge, at the end of a term or after finishing your studies.
- Perquisite A thing regarded as a special right or privilege enjoyed because of one's position. Nowadays, we just say "perk."
- A Fly A light horse-drawn public passenger vehicle or a light, covered, vehicle hired from a livery stable. (The equivalent of an Uber today.)
- Plowed Failing spectacularly, probably because the student spent their year drinking and partying (not referring to being drunk).
- The deuce A homonym of deuce "devil" is deuce "two at dice or cards." So, it's another way of expressing yourself forcefully without swearing.
- You're a brick You are a person who is strong emotionally or loyally.
- Farrago A confused mixture, hodgepodge.

Customs and Culture in 1892

- Young women of high station could not be alone with men. They absolutely had to have a chaperone, or their reputations could be ruined.
- Men stood up when women entered a room and stood until the woman or women sat down.
- Young girls wore their hair down, but once a girl was "out in society" (about age 16), they were expected to wear their hair up in public. Since a woman's hair was her "crowning glory," only her husband was allowed to see it down.
- Gloves were worn outside by both sexes.
- Men and women were very formal with each other prior to being betrothed.
- When a man met a woman outside, he was expected to raise, or "tip," his hat.
- Women used parasols as a form of sunscreen. Upper-class women were supposed to keep their complexions as pale white as possible.

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Director's Notes —

Charley's Aunt is one of my all-time favorite plays. I first got to see it in high school*(see note) and was entranced by the farcical high-energy comedy and the underlying heart of the play.

During the rehearsal process, one of the actors remarked, "This is a really silly play"—and there was general agreement! It *is* a silly play—but it is one of the most delightful ones I have ever seen! This is a farce where characters say and do ridiculous things and, yes, there is more than one of the mandatory chase scenes found in this type of play. There are both mistaken and concealed identities—all are not who they pretend to be.

A chaperone for young ladies when they meet with gentlemen is a nonnegotiable necessity in England in 1892. Once you accept the basic premise—that when the real aunt can't show up on time to be a chaperone to the young men in their luncheon meeting with their intended brides, why, of course, one of their male friends "must" dress up and impersonate the aunt—then everything else just falls into place.

What starts fairly innocently as an improvised stopgap (subbing in their friend [nicknamed Babbs] as "Charley's Aunt,") soon turns into a desperate attempt to "keep all the plates in the air;" hence the high-energy pace of farce.

Another thing that I love about this play is that I believe it has more of a "heart" than many farces do. In between some of the high-energy scenes, there are much quieter moments, when characters reveal some of the wants and needs that make us all human. They want to overcome loneliness, they need to belong somewhere, and they yearn for someone to love. The playwright Brandon Thomas allows us to see the characters' inner selves, which makes this a much warmer, more tender farce than a typical one.

Charley's Aunt is a classic of the theatre, and I hope that you enjoy both the romp and the tender bits as much as I do!

*Note: I also got to read this play in Spanish in my junior year of high school Spanish class and was fascinated by the formality of the culture between men and women of the upper class—before marriage in the Victorian year of 1892. The young people who are courting address each other in the formal form of "you" (usted) until something momentous happens—and then, in the middle of a scene, they switch immediately into the informal form (tu).



including Doubt, Monstrous Regiment, Waiting for Godot, Nevermore: The Dark World of Edgar Allan Poe, and Frankenstein. Elsewhere, he has directed many productions, including As You Like It, Working, Old Times, and South Pacific. As an actor, David has appeared in many productions, including Tartuffe and Dracula. David holds an MFA in directing from Illinois State University and has taught theatre at Illinois Wesleyan and Moraine Valley Community College. David thanks everyone who worked to make the production a success and especially his ever-patient wife, Katie, and daughter, Allison, for their love and support.



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Brandon Thomas —

Talter Brandon Thomas (24 December 1848 – 19 June 1914) was an English actor, playwright, and songwriter, best known as the author of the farce Charley's Aunt.

Born in Liverpool to a family with no theatrical connections, Thomas worked in commerce, and as an occasional journalist, before achieving his ambition of becoming an actor. After a succession of minor roles, he became increasingly sought after as a character actor. He wrote more than a dozen plays, the most celebrated of which, Charley's Aunt, broke all historic records for plays of any kind with an original London run of 1,466 performances, opening in 1892.

It has had numerous subsequent productions all around the world, including many film and musical theatre adaptations.

Although Thomas never repeated prodigious success of Charley's Aunt, he maintained a career as an actor and dramatist until his death. acting mostly in comedy, but with occasional serious roles in the plays of Shakespeare and others.

Charlev's Aunt was written for his friend, the actor W. S. Penley. Later the two disagreed (and went to court) about how much, if any, of the plot was Penley's invention rather than Thomas's. Penley told a journalist in 1894, "The play was my idea and Brandon Thomas wrote it. Later on, we



went down into the country and worked at it. Then we worked it out on the stage." Penley produced the play and took the star role of Lord Fancourt Babberley. The early performances of the play were given on tour in the English provinces, beginning at Bury St. Edmunds on 29 February 1892, before opening at The Royalty Theatre on 21 December 1892. For the first few weeks in London, Thomas played the role of Sir Francis Chesney; he regularly played the part in later revivals until shortly before his death. The play was an immediate success and transferred to the larger Globe Theatre on 30 January 1893. It ran for a recordbreaking 1,466 performances across four years, closing on 19 December 1896.

The piece was successfully staged throughout the English-speaking world and, in translation, in many other countries. It had a major success on Broadway in 1893 and was revived there several times. In 1894, it was given both German and French premieres and was produced in Berlin every Christmas for many years. Thereafter, it was frequently revived for decades and successfully adapted for films and musicals.

Thomas died at his home in Bloomsbury, London, in 1914, aged 65, after a brief illness. He was buried in Brompton Cemetery. In its obituary notice, The Times quoted him as saying, "I hoped to go down to fame as a great actor. If I go at all, it will be as the author of Charley's Aunt."

This past year saw the passing of three long-time members of the GreenMan Theatre Troupe: Jim Ocasek, Harry Davis, and Jim Bruner.

Jim Bruner was our Renaissance Man: actor, director, playwright, Trustee, and genial host of Board meetings in the company of his two energetic English Springer



Spaniels. For several years, he performed as the King at Medieval Times. Among the shows he performed in with us were *Born Yesterday*, *Cash on Delivery!*, and *Tale of Two Cities*. He directed *Harvey* and two of the short pieces in our *After the End of the World* show, one of which he wrote. He also served for three years on the GreenMan Board. After 23 years in Orlando, Florida, where he worked as a banker, a director, and an actor, he moved back to our area, which was our gain and Florida's loss. He liked to end his program bios with the tag line "Thanks to GreenMan for a great place to work (and play)."

Harry Davis was an enthusiastic and well-respected member of the GreenMan family. Harry got his start with GreenMan when he played a poetry-loving gangster



in the murder mystery *Murder Stage Right*. Most recently, he performed with us in *The Tempest* and in 2022's 8 to the Bar/ista. Harry was also in Don't Drink the Water and Shakespeare in Hollywood. "I had the pleasure of working with Harry on his first show with GreenMan, Murder Stage Right, and The Tempest and 8 to the Bar/ista, his last two shows with us," said Carolyn Thomas-Davidoff. "Harry was such a gentle and lovely man. He threw his whole heart into the roles that he played, and worked very hard to make his roles the best that he could. I always enjoyed working with him and will miss him."

It was with great sadness that we learned of the death of founding GreenMan Theatre Troupe Board member James E. Ocasek this past November. Jim was connected to



GreenMan from its beginning and served on the GreenMan Board from 2004 until the time of his passing. He worked on numerous shows as technical director, scenic designer, or lighting designer. Jim also led many other projects behind the scenes, using his legal expertise to review and negotiate contracts for the theatre, representing GreenMan before local grant committees, and leading efforts to improve GreenMan's technical capabilities. He always worked hard to strengthen the organization, to make GreenMan's shows as professional as possible, and to provide a great experience for the many GreenMan

volunteers, on- and off-stage. To say he will be missed is an understatement. All we can do is to thank him again for his great friendship, his deep love of theatre, and his steadfast dedication to the group.

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




About GreenMan Theatre Troupe —
